## A Family History Project: Time Line Fun

Children love to "discover" their own history and with the celebration this summer of so much of Seneca Falls' history this project is a natural. So, have the kids get out their baby books and let's get started. Start with a roll of shelf paper. Draw a long line. The first mark on the line should be the date of your child's birth. Next, draw a line every few inches for each month and a heavy line to represent the beginning of each new year. (If your child is older, have them fill in the names of the months and the years.) Then, fill in the appropriate information, first smile, first word, first steps, starting school, losing a tooth. Don't forget to have this be your child's project...ask them what they think is important and add that to the time line! Have your child pick out some photos to tape or paste on to the time line. Or, you may want them to do some drawings of the events in their lives. This is a great rainy day project for young children! Finally, bring your child to Mynderse Library to "discover" other people's history.
