

The Age of Polaris

On July 12, 2005, the Seneca Falls Library left the antiquated world of DOS as we abandoned the Dynix Automated Circulation System and began circulating by the Windows based Polaris System. We appreciate your patience and understanding as we learned how to function with the new system. We also apologize for any delays, mix-ups, and glitches encountered during the switch over. I believe the worst is over and calm seas lie ahead.

You, the patron,

will definitely notice a big change with Polaris. Polaris gives us greater control over the cataloging of books and other library materials. We will no longer be waiting on Finger Lakes Library System to catalog new materials. This means there will be less time processing and waiting for new books. Polaris allows creating a guick-bib and the immediate circulating of new books. Now all I have to do is find the time to order the books in the first place.

Patrons should also notice quicker checkout times. With Dvnix, each screen could only perform one function. You had to leave checkout to go into check-in and you had to leave circulation to go into cataloging. With Polaris, all functions can be accessed from the one screen and you can toggle back and forth between the functions. Checking-in and out and finding materials will be much easier and faster.

Polaris allows you to do all the things you could do with Dynix. You can search the automated card catalog; you can place holds and renew books all from your home computer. Just access Finger Lakes Library System at www.flls.org and click on search catalog.

So, give Polaris a try. I am sure you will like it. If you have any questions or experience any problems, the library staff is ready, willing, and able to help. If they can't, they have committed to memory the phone number and extension number of the Finger Lakes Library System computer department. They can definitely help.

Mother Marianne Cope Anwei Skinsnes Law

Anwei has studied Mother Cope her entire life and will tell us of her devotion to dignity. Mother Marianne Cope, also called Blessed Marianne of Molokai, lived, worked and died for the lep-

ers of Hawaii. As a Sister of the Third Order of St. Francis, Mother Marianne Cope worked for several years in Syracuse, New York, helping to found St. Joseph's Hospital. In 1883, she went to Kalaupapa, Hawaii where she spent thirty years ministering to

those with leprosy. While in Hawaii, she worked hand in hand with Father Damien during the last part of his life

On May 14, 2005, Mother Marianne was the first person beatified by Pope Benedict XVI in a ceremony in Vatican City. Mother Cope will be among those inducted into the Women's Hall of Fame October 7th & 8th.

Seneca Falls Canal History Fran Cariccilo

Water played an important role in the development of Seneca Falls. The rapids originally found in the Seneca River attracted businesses that used the waterpower to develop mills, distilleries, tanneries and factories of all types, such as the Seneca Knitting Mills. By 1818, locks had been con-

structed, creating the first version of the Cayuga -Seneca Canal, which allowed boat traffic to avoid the rapids. Ten years later, the Cayuga-Seneca was linked to the Great Erie Canal. The cultural diversity of Seneca Falls is a result of the arrival of immigrant workers who originally came to build the canal and the railroad, staying to make Seneca Falls their home. The manufacture of pumps has been a large part of Seneca Falls' history since the early 1800s. Goulds Pumps, Inc. remains a major local industry. October 13 at 7:00pm at the Library!
